SAFETY SURVEY 2019

How do the adults at school keep you safe while you are in school? Can you give examples?

- If someone is hurt or bullied, they can tell someone on duty and they will help to make it right.
- We have fire practices where we take a register and make sure no one is lost. We close the blinds for a lock-down.
- If something is really bad like a serious incident (worse than a level warning), SLT will deal with it.
- Mr Waller helps to keep us safe, e.g. removing a dead animal from the school; clearing broken glass after a school fayre; fixing a broken window. He also fixes things, e.g. if a tree has fallen down, he'll block it off.
- Mrs Stevenson and Mrs Rawl make us better when we are sick and send us home when we are ill so other children won't catch it and get sick too.

What do you know about staying safe online? What have you learned in school to help you with this?

- If we are on the internet and chatting to someone we've never met and they ask us to meet them in the park, we must tell our parents!
- If we are on our PS4 on a call and they're mean, you can report them (click a button) or block them.
- Make our profile picture a cartoon character.
- We should not go on a website that an adult has not approved.
- We should be careful not to buy things online by accident.
- We have rules for computer use in class.
- Our recent 'Growing Against Violence' (GAV) sessions have helped teach us about online safety.
- Teachers discuss online safety in class.

What have you learned about how to stay safe while you are NOT in school? Can you give examples?

- To not talk to strangers.
- We should hold our mummy or daddy's hand or the pushchair especially when we are near the road.
- We should stay with our parent or carer at all times.
- If you are on the tube in a different carriage to a friend, never go through the interconnecting door.
- It is not safe to run away from your parents.
- Be aware of things that might not be good, e.g. if you see something suspicious, tell a parent and go away from it.
- If a ball goes on the road, don't follow it.



What could you do if you notice something/someone in school that you think is not safe? Do you have any examples of this happening?

- Tell a teacher
- If you don't know the name of someone in the school, don't talk to them.
- If you've never seen someone in school before, you could tell a teacher.
- I know a grown-up is safe if they are wearing a lanyard.
- At hometime, tell a teacher before you go off – if you don't know someone who is there to collect you at pick-up, tell a teacher. If you noticed something unsafe in the playground or school, tell Mr Waller.
- Don't listen to peer pressure.

What else might we do at school to keep you even safer?

- Sometimes in the medical room, just a wet tissue might not be enough. Ice instead?
- More teachers could be down the path at playtime so that they know if anyone is lying in an argument.
- Some children might be allergic to some weeds in the playground.
