- Uno cards for classes The children have really enjoyed playing with these at playtimes. Any donations would be gratefully received.


YR's Literacy – Stick Man and Buddying up with Y6:

They went on a walk around the playground to collect different sticks and then compared the length and size of these and used them to create their own Stick Man.

We have been so proud of how well Reception have settled into full days at school and Y6 have loved buddying up with them too! Y6 have been excellent role models, inducting YR into our St. Mary's family.





Y1 Biscuit Bear and icing biscuits: As a way in to their new English text 'Biscuit Bear' by Mini Grey, Year 1 have been icing biscuits. Just like Biscuit Bear in the story, they used icing, glace cherries, candied peel, currants and hundreds and thousands to decorate their biscuits.

Y2 Finger Puppets:

As part of Y2's learning in Design Technology, they have made wonderfully creative finger puppets. They planned their designs on paper, thinking carefully

about how to make them in 3 dimensions. The children have developed precision cutting skills and have learned how to sew their fabric purposefully. After the children

made their puppets they evaluated their designs by choosing two things they were pleased with and something they thought could improve their design.

Linked to their Literacy text 'Funnybones', the children in Y3 have made articulated paper puppets. They have written scripts and used the puppets to bring these to life in a live performance to the class!

Y4 Lincolnsfields Residential Trip:

Y4 have returned from their first residential school visit this week. The spent 2 nights and 3 days at Lincolnsfields activity centre where they had a wonderful time building dens in the woods, exploring the woodland and learning about the wildlife that grows there. Y5 Harvest Festival at St Albans Cathedral:

On Thursday 6th October, Y5 represented St Mary's School at the St. Albans Diocesan Harvest Festival at St. Albans Cathedral.

St. Albans Diocese is a family of 138 schools from six Local Authorities: Bedford Borough, Central Bedfordshire, Hertfordshire, Luton, Barnet and Buckinghamshire. The event was a lovely way to come together to celebrate God's generosity and greatness.

Y6 Layered Portraits:

Y6 have explored how artists use various aspects of their identity, creating imagery which explores many different aspects within one image by using layers and different positions.

They were inspired by the artists Njideka Akunyili Crosby, Yinka Shonibare, Thandiwe Muriu and Mike Barrett. The children experimented with different printing and layering techniques too. They wouldn't be out of place in the Tate Modern!



A brief message on behalf of the St. Mary's School Governing Body:

Dear Parents,

This week we had our second governors' meeting of the academic year (we can't believe how quickly the weeks have gone by already), spending quite a bit of time talking about the school finances, and the impacts of inflation and the cost of living crisis. I hadn't appreciated before coming a governor how tight school budgets really are, and would like to thank all parents for any voluntary contributions that have been made. They really are key to supporting the school in these challenging times and ensuring that Maria and her team can offer the very best learning experience for the children.

As the education system gets back into a more 'regular pattern', one of things we're expecting to experience this year is a long overdue Ofsted inspection. It's been over 10 years since we had a full Ofsted visit and I know that Maria and the team are looking forward to presenting the school, our talented pupils and the wonderful teaching and support team. In 2021, the then Education Secretary, Gavin Williamson, oversaw a 're-boot' in the way Ofsted inspections are carried out. He and the chief inspector of Ofsted wanted to ensure all schools get more regular inspections and to deliver a re-distribution of school ratings. It's going to be really exciting to see the school tested against this evolved and now very ambitious framework, which sets out extremely high standards for schools to aspire to. We're looking forward to seeing how St. Mary's has progressed since 2010, and learning how we can continue to grow and develop in the future.

As the clocks change and the leaves start to fall, I wish you all a good half term break and look forward to meeting some of you later in the academic year.

A quick note about bumped heads:

At present, we contact a parent/carer via text whenever a child has any injury on the head area. This may be a scratch on the nose, a bump to the cheek or a bump on the head. Most of the time the child is fine and forgotten about their injury by the time they get home!

If your child has a minor head bump, they will be treated and given a 'bumped head' sticker which will alert the teaching staff of the bump so that they can monitor them in class and so that you are aware that this has happened. We will also send an email so that you are aware of what happened.

We will only contact parents/carers by phone if their child has had a serious head injury. First aiders will assess your child and will contact you if your child exhibits any of the following symptoms:

- Unconsciousness, or lack of consciousness (i.e. difficulty keeping eyes open)
- Vomiting more than once
- Any sign of blood or watery fluid coming from the nose or ears
- Any complaint of a headache
- Any complaint of 'seeing double' or 'blurred vision'

If your child has sustained a head injury, observe them closely for 24 hours to monitor whether their symptoms change or get worse. They may cry or be distressed but this is normal – with attention and

reassurance most children will settle down. However, seek medical assistance if your child continues to be distressed. NHS Direct provide full details of symptoms and treatment for minor head injuries. http://www.nhs.uk/Conditions/Head-injury-minor/Pages/Introduction.aspx

If First aiders are in any doubt, they will contact parents/carers to ask you to come and assess your child.

Things to do/know for Half Term and Early November:




