TALK TOGETHER about Forgiveness

Everyone makes mistakes, it's part of being human. Sometimes our mistakes hurt others and then we need to say sorry. Sometimes mistakes made by other people hurt us. When this happens we need to be able to **forgive**. **Forgiveness** can be difficult and costly but without it a new start is impossible. Talk together about:

- A time when you needed to say sorry
- A time you didn't say sorry but wish you had
- A time when you had to **forgive** someone who had hurt or upset you
- How it feels when you are given a new start because someone has forgiven you

Our focus value for this half term is forgiveness

In collective worship this week, we have looked at the life of Nelson Mandela. Despite his terrible treatment and imprisonment during apartheid in South Africa, he famously forgave those who mistreated him: "Courageous people do not fear forgiving for the sake of peace"

We have been exploring the following question: What the world would be like without forgiveness?

Here are some responses from children in different classes.

- It would be terrible as society's key is forgiveness.
- There would be lots more war and lots of people disagreeing.
- You would always be angry and there will be disorder.
- Everyone will be lonely because people will do things and will hold a grudge forever even though the problem might have been really small.
- Nobody will be able to wipe the slate clean.
- The world would be an unhappy and sad place.
- The world would be disappointing because nobody would forgive.
- There would be lots of shouting.
- It won't be nice because if you don't forgive then people won't forgive you.

Road Safety:

We have had reports of some children not taking care crossing the roads around school, which is a big concern. Please remind the children of the importance of crossing safely.

As part of our curriculum, we do cover road safety and additionally, Y5 and Y6 will be having a Transport for London session in school next Friday.



Science Week:

Next week is Science week in school. We are looking forward to planting wildflower seeds in class garden plots, and lots of learning on the theme 'connections'. We will also be welcoming a group of parents who have Science based professions to speak to the children. We are hoping to inspire them to see how their Science learning now, can be applied to their future career choices! Many thanks in advance, to those parents/carers for their time.
