Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope this finds you all safe and well and that you had a restful Easter break. The beginning of the summer term at St Mary's marks the start of our traditional May Day season and the children have already begun rehearsing, starting with Y6 who unplaited the ribbons of the May pole on Wednesday.

For families new to the school, May Day is a long upheld tradition at St. Mary's here is a link to the event that we recorded in 2021 when we were unable to have an audience. A text will go out shortly, asking you to fill in a short form to let us know about lunch arrangements on the day. The majority of children go home and return at school at 1.15 for a 1.30 start to the event. Once the message goes out, please respond as soon as possible.

What to wear:

• Traditionally, girls have worn white dresses on May Day. As we have done in recent years, we would like to offer girls the option of wearing something colourful instead if it means that they can wear a dress that they already own. Please don't feel that you need to purchase a new dress. Please note that the children need to be able to skip and kneel, so dresses should not be too long or too short. If you would like to borrow a dress for the day, please give us a ring. We have a small stock of white dresses that have been donated to the school.

If for any reason, your daughter prefers not to wear a dress, for cultural or personal reasons, please do get in touch with your child's teacher.

Boys will need to wear a white shirt or polo shirt and dark grey school trousers or shorts. They can
also wear a school tie if they'd like to, which is £3.50 and can be purchased on School Money Shop
on Eduspot.

All children will need to wear suitable footwear for skipping; no sandals please. Plimsolls or canvas shoes are most ideal. We will share more details about the event nearer the time. We are looking forward to welcoming the Director of Education for St. Albans Diocese and the Chief Executive and Director of Education and Learning for Barnet to join us too.

Online Safety:

Our children are digital natives. They are so at home with technology it's like an extension of themselves...

The positives of technology far outweigh the negatives. Parents often fear the potential negative impact of social modia, online bullying, adult content and 'produces' — the modia confronts us all with so

social media, online-bullying, adult content and 'predators' – the media confronts us all with so many negative headlines and frightening stories. But the internet also offers amazing opportunities for learning, having fun with friends, creating and publishing ideas, pictures and video, collaborating and enjoying music and media. While it might be tempting to ban internet access or smart phones, this simply makes children more vulnerable when they go it alone. Just as parents teach children how to cross the road safely, staying safe online needs a similar approach.



So, how do you enable your children to benefit from technology while staying safe?

Here are 5 key things you should consider doing at home:

- 1. **Educate yourself** Go on Tik Tok, Instagram, Snapchat and YouTube to find out what they are all about. Know the age limits for popular apps and why these limits exist. Ensure that children do not have access to apps that are designed for older users.
- 2. Educate your children Talk about what you should and shouldn't do:
 - Don't share your name, address and any personal information
 - Don't say anything you wouldn't say to someone's face or that could be unkind
 - Do come forward and speak to someone if you see or hear anything inappropriate online.


Make sure your children understand that their 'digital footprint' can be seen by school, universities, colleges and employers in the future so it's important to exercise caution now.

- 3. Monitor As far as you can, engage with your child and talk about what they are doing online. Younger children should only use the internet when they are in a family area and you can keep a constant eye on what they are doing. As they get older they will demand more privacy, but it's important to stay interested; keep the lines of communication open. It's essential that online access on mobile devices is closely monitored.
- 4. **Protect** There are filtering systems available that will block unsuitable content. Some are free, others you can buy. Filtering can be very effective but no system is 100% fool-proof, so education remains key.
- 5. **Support** We all make mistakes, particularly when we are young. Be approachable. Make sure your children know they can talk to you if something goes wrong. And make sure you know what to do if it does. Most sites now have 'report abuse' buttons where you can report inappropriate behaviour.




