### KS2 Half Term Curriculum Plan / Home Learning Letter

Year 5

#### Autumn 2nd Half Term: November 2023

Dear Parents/Carers,

We hope that you had an enjoyable and relaxing half term and that children are refreshed and looking forward to an exciting half term ahead!

Please refer to the table below, for a brief overview of the learning experiences that the children will have in each subject, during this half term.

Subjects	Focus of Learning
English	Our focus text this half term is Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. We will be using this to enhance our inference skills to study the characters; revisiting writing a newspaper article and focusing on poetry to write and perform our own sonnet. In the last weeks of term, we will be moving onto our Christmas text 'The Christmas Truce' by Carol Ann Duffy. We will use this to further practise our inference and deduction skills by looking closely at the characters before writing a diary entry about 'A Day to Remember'. Our punctuation and grammar focus this half term is on using punctuation correctly in our writing. We will revise using apostrophes of contraction and possession along with punctuating direct speech. We will also look at using hyphens, semi-colons and using different ways to punctuate parenthesis. We will be continuing to work on the skills of proofreading to improve writing and spelling. We will also be continuing to focus on neat cursive handwriting. Our spelling focuses this half term will be the Year 5 / 6 statutory spellings.
Reading	We will be continuing to use the reciprocal reading strategies: predicting, questioning, clarifying and summarising to support reading. Children will continue to benefit from reading comprehension practice and there will be opportunities for children to discuss books they have read. Children will continue to access reading books in school and should be bringing reading books to and from school each day. Children will access accelerated reader and can search the app for any titles they have read at home so they can complete quizzes on these. They will have opportunities to complete the quizzes on these books in school. Please continue to encourage children to read with you at home so they have the opportunity to use the fab four reciprocal reading strategies at home as well. In addition, I will be asking children to write four sentences in a reading record each week demonstrating the reciprocal reading strategies for the book they are currently reading. They will make a prediction, ask a question about what they have read, clarify a word or idea and write a short summary each week.
Maths	In Maths this half term we will start by exploring factors, prime, square and cubed numbers. We will revise multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1000 before moving onto equivalent fractions, improper fractions and mixed numbers. We will be building up to adding and subtracting fractions and mixed numbers. Children will continue our weekly arithmetic practice to increase confidence in using the arithmetic methods.
Science	Our Science Topic in Y5 is entitled 'Feel the Force'. The children will build on learning about contact and non-contact forces in Year 3. In this module children learn about the forces of gravitational attraction, air resistance, water resistance and friction. We

	will move onto think about applied forces using levers, pulleys and gears to allow a smaller force to have a greater effect.
Computing	Computing this term will focus on coding. We will be looking at coding efficiently and simulating a physical system. Children will learn what decomposition and abstraction are in Computer Science and begin to understand what a function is and how functions work in code. We will also begin to look at text variables and strings in coding.
Geography	In Geography this half term, we will be exploring our new topic 'Mountains'. We will begin by describing what a mountain is and how they are formed. We will then look at the climate of mountainous regions and move onto exploring the UK's highest mountains. We will complete our unit by learning about the importance of the Himalayas.
PHSCE	In PSHCE this half term we will be 'Celebrating Difference'. Children will begin to understand that cultural differences can sometimes cause conflict and will be helped to further understand what racism is. Children will learn about different types of bullying, including how name-calling and spreading rumours can be bullying behaviours. They will explore strategies for managing situations that might involve bullying and will consider how to help if someone is being bullied.
Art	This half term children, will be exploring theatre set design. We will start by looking at the work of Rae Smith a set designer working in theatre. They will go onto design their own set using their sonnet as a stimulus and making a model of this, on which they will create a character to perform their poem. <b>Children will need to bring in a named</b> <b>shoebox sized cardboard box in which to create their set. These can be brought in at</b> <b>any time during the first 2 weeks of the half term.</b>
RE	This half term in RE we will be exploring the big question 'How Can Following God Bring Freedom and Justice?'. We will be looking at the story of Moses and the Exodus and connecting this with concepts of freedom and salvation. We will look at how some Christians put their beliefs about how they should behave as people of God into practice by trying to bring freedom to others. Children will have an opportunity to identify ideas about freedom and justice that arise from the Bible texts and discuss how far these are helpful or inspiring and justify their opinions.
Music	In Music this half term we will be starting with some background work for our trip to the London Symphony Orchestra concert. We will explore the traditional Indian instruments and use of raga and tala in Indian music. After the concert we will be focusing on learning the songs for the Junior Christmas Production. Our focus will be on self-correcting if lost or out of time and singing expressively, with attention to breathing, phrasing, dynamics and articulation.

#### Home Learning

Home learning will continue to be set on Google Classroom. It will consist of an English, Topic or Reading activity as well as a Maths related activity. It will be set on a **Friday** and needs to be completed and turned in by the following **Tuesday**. A photo can be taken of the learning and then uploaded and submitted to Google Classroom. In addition, there will be a list of weekly spellings uploaded each **Friday** which will be tested in school the following Friday.

In addition to these home learning tasks, we recommend that children also engage with TT Rockstars on a regular basis. Please let a member of the Year 5 team know, if you need any help accessing these platforms

#### <u>Reading</u>

One of the most important ways in which you can support your child's learning is to ensure that they engage with 10-15 minutes reading every day. It is really helpful if you can take some time to read with your child and discuss what they have read. Whilst reading, encourage your child to make predictions and ask questions about the text. Try to help them identify and clarify words or phrases that they are unsure about and encourage them to summarise a paragraph or page that they have just read. This will support them to write their four sentences in the home-school reading record each week and help to support their developing comprehension skills. It is also beneficial to read aloud to your children. When your child finishes reading a book, they will have the opportunity to complete an Accelerated Reader quiz at school. The children will keep a reading record (paper

copy) in school, on which they will record the book titles they are reading, a brief comment and any 'Accelerated Reader' quiz scores that they achieve; quiz scores will also be printed and stuck into children's home-school reading records each half term so they can share their successes at home. Please encourage children to hand in their reading records once a week to ensure we can review these in class and share the half-termly quiz scores.

## <u>P.E.</u>

This year, our PE days will be every **Monday** and **Friday**. Our coached PE sessions with Mr Kerr will take place on a Friday. The class will also have a teacher lead PE session on a Monday. On these days, children will need to **come in to school wearing their PE kit**. This should consist of their school PE t-shirt, jogging bottoms/PE shorts and trainers (not plimsolls, due to possible wet weather). Please also ensure that any long hair is tied back for all PE lessons.

### What does my child need in school?

- As the weather is often unpredictable, please ensure your child is wearing layers as the classroom windows will remain open for ventilation throughout the year. Please bear this in mind as the weather starts to get colder. Children should bring a rainproof coat every day.
- Named school jumper/cardigan/coat
- Named water bottle (water fountains are still not in use)
- Children may use a small backpack or plastic bag if they'd like to bring anything in. Please make sure that this is not too big to avoid hazards in the cloakroom.
- Children can bring in school book bags if they have them.
- Your child will need a pencil case containing pencils, handwriting pen, small ruler, eraser, sharpener (one that holds sharpenings), colouring pencils, small glue stick. Please can you ensure this is able to **fit into their tray** as large pencil cases on desks make it difficult for children to concentrate on their work and can leave very little room for exercise books.
- Small packet of tissues, and we also ask for any donations of larger tissue boxes for the classroom.
- Please replenish handwriting pens, pencils and glue sticks as the term goes on.

**Please name or distinguish any equipment brought from home.** Children often have the same pens or felt tips and it is impossible to reunite lost articles with their owners if these are not named, which can cause distress.
