### 'Hope-anuary' at St Mary's, East Barnet

In December 2023, St Mary's Primary, East Barnet established a Year 6 Hope Committee as an outcome of reflections they'd had in collective worship and in response to feelings of hopelessness when hearing the news about violence in Israel and Palestine.

The Hope Committee launched 'Hope-anuary' by creating a checklist of activities with the ambition of spreading a little hope to others and to remind themselves to be ambitious, thoughtful, and hopeful. They acknowledged that whilst they couldn't change what they'd heard in the news, they could do small things in their own lives to bring about hope. Here are just a few examples of hopeful acts from some of the children:

- Showing signs of peace e.g. shaking hands after a football match, not holding a grudge, and hugging brothers and sisters after a disagreement.
- Taking care of nature e.g. re-using a plastic milk bottle to make a bug hotel and making lots of bird feeders.
- Taking toys to a children's ward at Barnet Hospital to make poorly children feel more hopeful, and the recognition that doing kind things for others makes us feel good too.
- Taking time to notice and show that they care. Many children shared examples of listening to or hugging friends when they were sad, helping out at home by tidying bedrooms, washing up, sweeping floors or taking dishes to the sink.

The school reflected on what a hope-filled future might look like. Here are a few thoughts:

- 'A world where there is no war, climate change is halted and/or reversed, and serious diseases have a cure or prevention'
- 'A safe, loving, healthy and family-filled future'
- 'A happy, healthy family and peace on Earth.'

Of course, hope isn't just for January. Each class has made a commitment to be responsible for one 'hope focus' for the year.

## Values Day at St Mary's, Northchurch



In January, St Mary's Primary, Northchurch had a Values Day. Everyone, parents and staff included, voted on the new values they would have. The values chosen were Love, Courage, Respect, Joy, Forgiveness and Kindness. Each class made a special poster for one of the values.

### St Mary's High Pupil's Poem Published

St Mary's CE High School are proud to have a published author among their student body. Oliver Lodge, a Year 7 student at St Mary's in Cheshunt, submitted an entry to the national Young Writers poetry competition for 11-18 year olds and he is one of just 171 writers whose work has been selected for publication.

The theme of the competition, and the title of the resulting book, is This Is Me - Poetry, Promises and Possibilities. Every entry is limited to 100 words, posing quite a challenge to create a fully-formed poem in such a short format.

Oliver was presented with his very own copy of the book in a school assembly. When asked about entering the competition, he said "I enjoy writing in general, not just poetry. When the category came up in the writing competition I decided to enter. I didn't find it too difficult but I did spend a fair amount of time working on it. I wanted it to be a good poem and accurate about myself."

Year 7 Lead at the school, Sarah Andrews, said "With no limits on poetic style, the competition gave students the opportunity to take control of what and how they wanted to

write, and how best to describe themselves; who they are and what they want to be. Oliver wrote a wonderfully positive poem about himself and his life. Congratulations to him, we are all immensely proud, this is a great achievement to have



work published at such a young age."

## Ash Wednesday at St Mary's

On 14 February, St Mary's Primary School, Welham Green marked the start of the Church's season of Lent and the period of preparation as we move towards Easter, when the Vicar, the Revd Ruth Barr, came into school to lead



a short Ash Wednesday service. Revd Ruth explained the tradition and symbolism behind the imposition of ashes and then staff and pupils, if they wanted to, had crosses of ash imposed on their foreheads or their hands. It was a very special and poignant way in which to begin the Lenten season.

### Climate Justice at St Nicholas, Stevenage

Year 6 pupils from St Nicholas Primary joined forces with CADFOD, Christian Aid, Oxfam, Save the Children and Send my Friends to School to tackle the issue of Climate Justice. The children linked both RE, art and geography learning to discuss how the Earth's climate is changing and what needs to happen for the future of the Earth.



The children were asked to come up with artistic ways of

sharing their opinions about climate change and their hopes for the planet and everyone who shares it. Their work was then put on display in a school exhibition at parents evening. The school were lucky enough to have two pieces of original art chosen to be displayed in the Houses of Parliament. The art work was also be displayed in school and each child received a framed photo of their artwork.

The children also spoke with Stevenage's MP, The Rt Hon Stephen McPartland, during his visit to the school about what the local council and central government saw as their responsibility for change. The children were keen to impress that as caretakers of the Earth it was everyone's role to play a part.

## RE Day at St Michael's, Bishop's Stortford

On 8 February, St Michael's Primary School, Bishop's Stortford held a whole school RE day with a focus on light. The day launched with a whole-school worship looking at the concept of light and reflecting on how light features prominently across religions and the world itself. During the day, the children worked in mixed age groups to rotate around a range of workshops, each looking at light within a different festival or religion, from the Buddhist



festival of Tazaungdaing to the Islamic festival of Ramadam. The children engaged in discussion, writing and crafts during these workshops and then shared their knowledge and findings in a whole school worship at the end of the day. The children enjoyed working in mixed age groups and it was wonderful to see how some children appreciated their own beliefs and practices being identified and recognised within the school.

## **NEWS FROM THE SCHOOLS TEAM**

#### **Focus on Governance**

#### **PCC** foundation governor appointments

This time I have focused on two FAQs about foundation places where the PCC is the appointing body. This applies mostly to maintained schools but is also relevant to a small number of single academy trusts.

#### Why should PCCs not appoint staff as foundation governors?

Appointing staff as foundation governors in their own school creates serious conflicts of interest. It also affects overall governance capacity and distribution of workload across the governing board, because statutory regulations exclude staff from certain governance roles and tasks. The DBE has a decades-long policy that it will not appoint staff as foundation governors in their own schools. However, where PCCs are unaware of these issues, some have in good faith made such appointments.

We advise that as a matter of good practice, current staff should not be appointed by PCCs or other appointing bodies as foundation governors in their own school. Where such appointments already exist, we suggest that they should not continue beyond the current term of office.

#### Why can't PCCs appoint governors for a term of less than four years?

The statutory term of office for an appointed foundation governor is always four years, unless an exception is already stated within the school's governing document (which applies to only a very small number of schools in the diocese). Situations have recently arisen where PCCs have appointed foundation governors for shorter terms, or have asked to 'extend' an existing appointment for say, one year.

Statutory appointments regulations (and appointments provision within academy articles) don't permit appointments to be extended in this way, nor to be made for a shorter term. Unless the school's Instrument of Government or academy articles has an existing exception clause, PCCs can only appoint foundation governors to the statutory four- year term.

Individual situations do of course arise where a shorter period of service would genuinely be helpful locally. The practical solution to this is that no governor is obliged to actually complete the full four years. Any governor may choose to stand down at any point before the end of their four-year term of office should they wish.

We will be amending our application forms to make these considerations clearer for PCCs and all involved in foundation appointments processes. If any questions arise, you are always most welcome to contact me directly for further advice.

# And finally...

### A Message for the End of Term

Dear Colleagues,

Once again, we find ourselves in Holy Week and fast approaching Easter.

This term, I have had the privilege of being part of three significant events: the DBE Senior Leaders Retreat in Canterbury, the Church School Leadership Course and the presentation session for the 'Race, Identity and School Leadership' course (RISL) run by Integrity Coaching. Through each event has run the theme of life stories, of points of reflection, transition, and growth. It has been humbling to listen to colleagues as they have shared how their understanding of what it means to be a leader in a Church of England school has shaped them and is shaping them.

Story is a central part of the Christian faith. As we grow in our understanding of faith, our perceptions can change, our hearts soften, and how we think and act changes. This process of revelation and change can be gradual or sudden; it can be predicted but often it is surprising and even unsettling.

In I Corinthians 13, the Apostle Paul steps aside from his great narrative on love, to shine a light on the journey of transformation and revelation experienced by countless Christians through the ages. It is a story of partial revelation but one rooted and founded in love.

<sup>8</sup> Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away. <sup>9</sup> For we know in part and we prophesy in part, <sup>10</sup> but when completeness comes, what is in part disappears. <sup>11</sup> When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became [an adult], I put the ways of childhood behind me. <sup>12</sup> For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.

<sup>13</sup> And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

You may be at one of these points of transition, change or revelation. You may be comfortable with this, or it may be a challenge to sit alongside your discomfort.

Paul reminds us that whatever may cease, whether it is prophecy, tongues or even knowledge, whatever may change, God's love is constant, it never fails. Whilst we currently may not know or understand everything, we are fully known and fully loved by God.

A crown of thorns, a cross, an empty tomb are all symbols of one of the most amazing, most profound life stories of all time. They are also a symbol of love, and that love has the ability and the capacity to hold us secure through our own life story. 'Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known'.

May you have a peaceful and blessed Easter.
